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What is a Semicolon?

- ★ Semicolons offer one way to connect two closely related thoughts.
- ★ Semicolons connect two similar thoughts that would not be complete on their own.

This is a semicolon>

Why use a Semicolon?

★ Semicolons are style marks that are stronger than a comma.

★ Can make your writing sound more sophisticated.

★ Indicate that your thought or statement is not over yet.

How to use a Semicolon?

- Between independent clauses when a coordinating conjunction is omitted (two clauses that could stand alone as separate sentences)
 - The upperclassmen are permitted off-campus lunch, but the underclassmen must remain on campus.
 - The upperclassmen are permitted off-campus lunch; the underclassmen must remain on campus.
- Between independent clauses linked by a transitional expression
 - Heavy snow continues to fall at the airport; consequently, all flights have been grounded.
- In lists with internal commas
 - The new store will have groceries on the lower level; luggage, housewares, and electronics on the ground floor; men's and women's clothing on the second floor; and books, music, and stationery on the third floor.

- 2. Mom wants the chores completed moreover she wants them done properly.
- 3. She didn't see the other car coming now her car has a huge dent.
- 4. I will be there as soon as I finish working that is a promise I will definitely keep.
- 5. You need new brakes otherwise you may not be able to stop in time.

- 2. We had students from Lima, Peru Santiago, Chile and Caracas, Venezuela.
- 3. She calls it the bathroom I call it the loo.
